Proposed Power Plant in Woodbridge - Franklin Woman's Club has always been environmentally concerned and has supported the fight against the Compressor Station proposed as part of the NESE project. There is another project which is just as close to us (not that proximity matters as the pollution spreads for miles and the devastating impact on the Climate Crisis isn't stop by borders on a map) – a prosed power plant in Woodbridge, on the Raritan River waterfront, an environmentally sensitive area. There are many reasons to oppose this proposal, but the most important one is that it is expected to spew millions of tons of greenhouse gases into the atmosphere every year. On behalf of the FWC, this committee Chair has signed on to the organizational letter to the Governor, opposing this project. We join the Franklin Township Environmental Commission and the Franklin Township Council, which have both passed resolutions against this project. Under Valerie's leadership our club donated generously to Shot at Life (to improve vaccination rates for children in underdeveloped countries), Operation Smile (to help children preparing for or undergoing cleft palate surgery) Free the Girls (helping young women who may have been victims of human or sex trafficking) among other service projects. Keeping us informed of important prevention efforts such as getting regular mammograms, heart health tips and more she will be missed in this service area.

Tough shoes to fill, but I am eager to try and continue the good work Valerie and our club has done in this service program area. I would like to invite any members interested in this service area to meet as a committee. If interested, please reach out to me or let me know at the September regular meeting.

September is recognized as Suicide Prevention month by NAMI (National Alliance for Mental Illness) and other health organizations. If you or someone you know is experiencing a mental health, suicide or substance use crisis or emotional distress, reach out 24/7 to the 988 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline (formerly known as the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline) by dialing or texting <u>988</u> or using chat services at <u>suicidepreventionlifeline.org</u> to connect to a trained crisis counselor. You can also get crisis text support via the Crisis Text Line by <u>texting NAMI to 741741</u>. At our September meeting, flyers announcing the new 988 hotline will be available, and members will be asked to get one flyer posted in a store or a doctor's office or other location to help get this information out.

Labor Day has passed, and that means we now begin campaign season. It is not too early to think about voting in the upcoming midterm election. The election is on November 8 this year (always the second Tuesday in November). If you are not registered to vote, the deadline to do so is October 18.

Many of us became accustomed to voting by mail during the pandemic and found that we liked the convenience of doing so. In-person voting will once again be an option in 2022. However, if you wish to vote by mail, you must now complete an application to do so. You will not automatically receive a vote-by-mail ballot unless you previously applied and selected the option to receive mail ballots for all future elections. You can learn how to obtain a vote-by-mail application (or print one off) at <u>vote (lwvnj.org)</u>, a League of Women Voters site which has all kinds of great information about participating in the upcoming election. Although you have until November 1 to submit your application for a mail-in ballot, why wait?

Our committee has taken a break over the summer, but we are following a couple of important developments that emerged in Franklin Township during the summer months. One is the proliferation of new warehouses being planned or developed in the township and the activism that has emerged in opposition. If interested, you can read about one of the activist efforts and a call to sign a petition here: <u>Petition · Stop Warehouse Sprawl in Franklin Township, Somerset County, New Jersey · Change.org</u> While it is unclear that a petition will have much direct effect, it definitely reflects a high level of concern on the part of township residents. In response to strong public concern, the Franklin Township Council in July voted unanimously in favor of an ordinance that calls for a detailed study of warehouses in certain areas. Although the Council's action is a positive step, some consider the ordinance too little, too late since it will not affect the building of new warehouses for which applications have already been completed.
